Helping Victims Retrieve and Disclose Traumatic Memories

For victims who report sexual assault, intimate partner violence, stalking, and other traumatic incidents, the purpose of an investigative interview is to help them:

- (1) *Retrieve* details of the traumatic event from memory, and
- (2) *Disclose* these details to an investigator.

This purpose is the same regardless of whether the interview is conducted by law enforcement, Title IX investigators, Human Resources personnel, or others. Yet achieving this goal requires a great deal of work before, during, and after the interview.
